Lighting the Christ Candle

At the heart of our faith is a light that does not flicker out. Our Christ Candle serves as a reminder that the light of Christ shines not behind us in the past, but ahead of us, guiding our every step. *Candle is lit.*

Lighting the Rainbow Candle

We also light the Rainbow Candle, a symbol of God’s covenant love. Our rainbow light reminds us that our diversity is not an obstacle to God, but a reflection of God’s creativity and joy. *Candle is lit.*

Land Acknowledgement

As we journey through this season of Epiphany, we acknowledge the land on which we worship. This land has long been home to Indigenous peoples, including the Anishinaabe, the Haudenosaunee, the Wendat, the Chippewa, and the Mississaugas of the Credit. It is a land where wisdom has been shared, relationships tended, and stories carried across generations. We also acknowledge that this land remains home to many diverse Indigenous nations and communities, whose presence, resilience, and leadership continue to shape this place.

May the light of Epiphany guide us toward truth, right relationships, and shared care for this land and for one another.

COMMUNION

This is not a table for the perfect, but a table for the hungry.
Not a reward for the righteous, but nourishment for those still learning how to love.
Jesus welcomed the poor, the grieving, the overlooked—and he welcomes us still.
All who seek grace are welcome here.

We lift them up to God.

Let us give thanks to God, our Creator.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Faithful God,
you create a world rooted in abundance,

You call us into covenant, teach us how to walk with integrity,

In Jesus, you climbed the hillside and spoke blessing into a weary world—

And so, with the faithful of every time and place, we praise you, saying:

On the night before he faced betrayal and loss,

Let us pray:

As the bread is broken and the cup is shared, make us participants in Christ’s work—
feeding those who hunger, healing what is wounded, and blessing those the world has
overlooked.

Nourish us with the bread of justice-seeking, and the cup of gratitude and joy, that we may learn
again what it means to walk with integrity, to love mercy, and to live into your promised realm
of shalom—salaam—peace.

As we share new life at this table, we remember those still waiting—some nearby, some far
away—for daily bread, for safety, for dignity, for belonging.

We hold before you those living with mental, spiritual, or physical health challenges;
those caught in cycles of fear, violence, or displacement; those struggling to name who they are,
or to trust how deeply they are loved.

Blessed are they, O God. Draw near, and let your peace take root.

Receive now the prayers of our hearts, spoken and unspoken. (*A time of silence is kept.*)

Ancient of Days,

shape us by your Word—steady us when we are overwhelmed,
soften us when we are afraid, and send us out as peacemakers
in these days of wonder, lament, and possibility.

Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory is yours,
God most holy, now and forever.
Amen.

Come, beloved of God. The table is ready.

Whether your faith feels strong or fragile, whether you arrive with confidence or questions,
