Land Acknowledgement

⁷ In the days of her affliction and wandering Jerusalem remembers all the treasures that were hers in days of old. When her people fell into enemy hands, there was no one to help her. Her enemies looked at her and laughed at her destruction.

John 20:19-29 Jesus Appears to His Disciples

¹⁹ On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁰ After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

²¹ Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." ²² And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

²⁴ Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

²⁶ A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

²⁸ Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

Reflection on Blue Christmas

Blue. The color is used to name and evoke sadness, melancholy, despair. Hence, we have the music genre known as the blues. At this time of year, when everyone is energized with excitement and expectation, those of us who have suffered some form of loss – the loss of a loved one, a long-held dream or desire – can only notice the holes left in our lives, and we may become paralyzed by our losses.

If it is true, as the saying goes, that "grief is the price we pay for love," then this service affords us the opportunity to recall and remember the gifts we have lost. That is not to say that our pain and sadness are not real-they are! But when we survey the past and review the gifts of loved ones and opportunities once cherished but that are no longer with us, we might find some balance. The memories might accentuate our loss. They might demand that we focus on that which is no longer. But we are not alone in our remembering. We are gathered in this community, and GOD is with us.

At this time of year, surrounded by all the hustle and bustle, it can seem as if no one notices us or remembers our grief, as if we don't exist. But the Holy One knows us, remembers us, and is sad with us. The Holy One has experienced loss. The Holy One experiences our loss. So, we are not alone.

Blue is also the color of the sea and the color of the sky – arms of the Creator holding everything together, holding us together. The sea and sky are a universal bracket surrounding us, weeping with us, hurting with us. And they are holding life and love for us when we have the strength to find these gifts again.
